Inclusion Meeting—November 9th

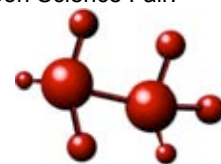

Audubon's Middle School Science Fair—November 10th (COMMUNITY WELCOME)

Join us November 10th, 9am-11:00 am, as Audubon 6th-8th graders exhibit their scientific expertise at the annual Audubon Science Fair.

Projects will be displayed in the gym. The fair opens at 9:00am. Upon visiting, please sign-in in the school office and then follow the signs to the Science Fair on the third floor. ***We're looking for up to 30 judges to assist on this day.***

No serious scientific expertise required. There will be a continental breakfast for judges at 8:30am in the community room and then Fair organizers will review the rubric with the judges, and then judging will begin at 9am and last until 11am. If you're interested in serving as a judge, please email assistant principal Eric Fay at ejfay@cps.edu. Judges do not need to be available the entire time. We would really like to encourage members of the local community and parents of our Pre-K - 5th grade students to participate as judges, as it is the upper grade students (grades 6-8) who are competing in the Fair, and it is not ideal to have parents judging their own kids.



Math and Science Night —November 10th

All Audubon families and friends are invited to join us from 6:00pm to 7:15pm for Math and Science Night which includes 1) a variety of math and science activities in several classrooms and 2) a chance to check out the Middle School Science Fair in the Gym, where students will be free to answer your questions, take photos, and share their scientific discoveries. The judging takes place during the day, but winners will be announced at 7:15pm. Classroom activities from 6-7pm include: Room 208 - 6th-8th Grade Math Games with Ms. Chan; Room 103 - Kindergarten-5th Grade Math Games with Ms. Valenzuela; Room 102 - Hands-On Science with Ms. Anderson and Ms. Whitney. All workshops and games are ongoing, so come whenever you can. Please join us for the science fair awards in the gym from 7-7:15pm



No School—November 11th

Celebrate **Veterans' Day** by stopping into your nearest branch of the Chicago Public Library and checking out some children's books on what it means to be a war veteran, or try these ideas on How to Teach Kids About Veterans Day, according to the Department of Veterans Affairs and EducationWorld.com: **1.)** Teach your children about the history of Veterans Day by having them create a time line of events leading to the observance of the holiday. **2.)** Have your kids write short articles or essays of how veterans are honored around the world. And if you know any veterans locally, propose that your kids interview them about what it's like to serve in the U.S. military. **3.)** Research

how American veterans were treated after they returned from various military conflicts, ranging from the French and Indian War to the Persian Gulf War. Ask your children to compare and contrast their findings. Also compare and contrast how women and minorities who served in those conflicts were treated. 4.) Have children draw a picture of Veterans Day, and what this holiday means to them. Military children can draw a picture of a parent who is currently deployed, or a relative who has served. 5.) Make a thank you card for veterans. Children can give this card to veterans that they know or to veterans who are listed through the local VA medical facility. 6.) Ask your children's teacher to invite veterans to their classroom. Veterans can discuss what it's like to serve in the military, and how important it is to observe this holiday. 7.) Have your kids make a colorful and fun poster with the names and pictures of relatives who are veterans. There are a variety of ways to celebrate Veterans Day with your children. And teaching children about the significance of this holiday will help give them a deep appreciation of our nation's service members and veterans.

LSC Meeting—November 16th (IMPORTANT TOPIC!—We need your input!)

Our next Local School Council (LSC) meeting is Monday evening, November 16th, at 6:30pm in the community room at Audubon School. This month AT&T will be presenting its proposal to install a cellular antenna on top of Audubon School in order to provide better coverage to its subscribers in the Roscoe Village/Lakeview/Wrigleyville area. Currently, their subscribers do not receive cell reception at Wrigley Field and AT&T is looking for a solution to this problem. AT&T is offering Audubon up to \$30,000 a year for the use of the school roof for this purpose. The issue of installing cellular antennas on top of schools is very controversial. CPS is allowing schools to make a decision at the local level. The main concern of the Local School Council is to evaluate the potential health risks to our children. There are strong arguments on both sides of this issue, from those declaring that the antenna poses no health risk to children, to those stating that the risks are significant or unknown at this time. The Local School Council encourages all parents to educate themselves on this issue over the next two weeks, and to come to the council meeting prepared to discuss the issue and to help make this important decision. We are inviting you to join the LSC to hear AT&T's proposal on November 16th, as we will be voting on whether or not to allow AT&T to use our school for their antenna that same evening. We want your voices to be heard as this is a very important issue. If you cannot make the meeting but would still like to voice your opinion please email Audubon's LSC Chairperson, Ellen Ericson at ellen_ericson@sbcglobal.net. 4th Annual Hawk Walk

A huge congratulations to the Audubon community for a record Hawk Walk revenue of more than \$15,000. With this money FoA will be purchasing new Smart Boards (at least 2, possibly 3) for Audubon classrooms. Congratulations also to the many individual



student prize winners and Audubon classrooms that won pizza and cupcake parties for Hawk Walk participation. 2009 ISAT Successes

Following Audubon's 2009 ISAT testing (grades 3 and above), Audubon's 2009 combined valued added scores in reading and math place Audubon 14th out of all CPS elementary schools. Audubon's percentile score in reading was 91 and in math 96. The CPS 2009-2010 Elementary School Performance Policy states that Audubon is now a Tier 1 school. Only 18% of all CPS schools are Tier 1. Audubon has set a goal that 95% of students in third grade will exhibit grade level proficiency on the ISAT test.

Audubon Needs Alumni Liaison

Audubon is looking for a parent volunteer who might be interested in being an alumni liaison for the purposes of fundraising and building our community. 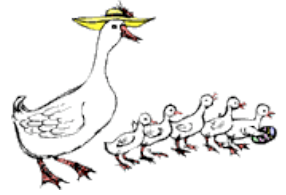
Parties should last no more than an hour, and should be the last portion of the day. For any further details or clarification, please consult with your child's classroom teacher.
